PAST RECENT EVENTS

1. As Waterloo branch we had twice tried to organise a visit to commemorate the Battle of Waterloo fought on 18th June 1815. This year it was "Third time lucky", although the original party of 16 in 2020 reduced to 5 owing to continuing worries about the increase in the number of cases of Covid. The weather throughout was fine, and the party were the first to climb the 226 steps to the top of Lion's Mound on Wednesday morning, with a wonderful view of the undulating battlefield, and now understand why the Duke of Wellington chose this site to place his troops. The party also visited the fortified Hougoumont Farm travelling by cart and 2 horses. This was pivotal to the outcome of the Battle. To end a memorable historic visit to the Waterloo Hotel, now a Museum, commemorating the Battle, which was the Duke's Headquarters. His original Victory table is still on show.

2. The Roast beef carvery luncheon took place at Butchers Hall, and was, as expected, greatly enjoyed.

3. A visit to the Royal Courts of Justice, with an informative guide, was followed by a walk, in fine weather, to the Old Bailey. Many decided to have lunch at the Viaduct Tavern which was opposite the Old Bailey.

4. A qualified conservationist, Jez, took 17 of us on the 3rd Historic pub tour, starting from the Coal Hole, Strand at 6 o'clock. Visiting 6 very old pubs around Covent Garden, with information on each, proved to be another very enjoyable evening, lasting just under 4 hours.

5. The Middle Temple visit was guided by a very knowledgeable Lady, whose late Husband had been a Q.C. there. The magnificent Hall survived the Blitz and that was where we were served lunch. Afterwards several visited the Crusader Templar Church close by.

I wish to thank all the Members of our branch for the magnificent support you have given over the last few years, including, of course, the hard-working Committee.

Finally, you may recall that we offered to return a year's subscription as no activities had taken place that year due to Covid. As an alternative, almost unanimously, you agreed to donate the money to a worthy cause and there are few worthier causes than GOSH - Great Ormond Street Hospital Charity for Children. The Hospital has chosen a piece of vital equipment. Our donation will help fund essential anaesthetic machines and monitors for the GOSH Neonatal and Paediatric Surgery Department. The specialist teams in this department provide pioneering surgical treatment for children facing some of the toughest conditions imaginable. The typical lifespan of each unit is seven to ten years, but at GOSH they have 24 machines which have been in service for over 24 years. With the machines being old and outdated, maintaining them is becoming increasingly difficult. It is vital that they replace these units and ensure the continuity of their services going forwards. In 19/20 GOSH were fortunate enough to replace five of these critical units, and with our generous support are one step closer to achieving their goal of replacing five more machines. They, and I, thank you for a donation of £1500 from our branch which will be doubled by the Royal Society of St. George Charitable Trust, making a total of £3000. The cheque will be presented shortly and a photograph will appear in our next Newsletter. Thank you again.
